## “CONNECTING THE COMMUNITY TO CHRIST!”

### Pastor's Desk

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I *passed* on the dessert tray the other night at dinner, tempting as it was. Most of us dread *passing* through the TSA screening lines at the airport when we're in a hurry. I *pass* columns like this your way hoping to stir your heart and mind on matters of faith and life.

One thing I will never *pass*, however, is *away*. Yes, one day I expect to die, and you'd be wise to expect the same. But none of us will simply “pass away.” That phrase seems to have become increasingly popular over the past few decades, even irritatingly popular. A survey of modern-day obituaries reveals that nearly 50 percent of families no longer refer to the *death* of their loved one. Grandma has merely “passed away.” Or, when time is of the essence, she merely “passed.”

As a pastor, I have the opportunity to visit with funeral directors while riding in the hearse. Many have shared with me that this linguistic trend is an attempt to make death sound less cold, gentler, and not so harsh. Perhaps they are right. We don't do well with the *finality* of death. Despite what the world claims, death is not natural, but unnatural. It was never a part of God's original creation. No, we brought this malady upon ourselves when our first parents, Adam and Eve, disobeyed God and ate of the forbidden fruit. As a result, we now seek to keep death at arm's length. We live in denial of it. To speak of father's death as a

“passing” is to lend a wispy and soft feel to his disappearance, almost as if an unsuspecting El Paso wind mysteriously swept him out of view.

“When a person is born we rejoice,” anthropologist Margaret Mead once wrote. “And when they're married we jubilate. But when they die we try to pretend nothing has happened.” To pretend as if the sudden absence of our spouse's voice or laugh at the table doesn't affect us is to perform a disservice to ourselves. Faith in the Savior allows us to face the reality of death. Emerging alive from the tomb on Easter, Jesus has defeated death and won the victory of eternal life for us. “Where, O death, is your victory?” St. Paul triumphantly asks, “Where, O death, is your sting?” (1 Cor. 15:55). It teaches us that grief can be a gift, just as tears rolling down the cheek can be a love offering for that loved one who has died. Our hope is in Christ!

Trying to soft-pedal death with the language of “passing away” sounds all the more awkward when we try to speak of its counterpart—*birth*—in similar ways. As an experiment, try not to think of yourself as being born. Instead, envision yourself as gradually “showing up.” Can't we just be straightforward about the two bookends of life? We're *born*. And we *die*.

Christ Jesus overcame *death* and the grave for us. We're never told He holds a victory flag over our “passing away.” If that were the case Paul's



inspired words in 1 Corinthians 15 would have to be rewritten: “*Passed away* has been swallowed up in victory.” “Where, O *passed away*, is your victory? Where, O *passed away*, is your sting?” (vv. 54b-55) Huh!?

When the day arrives for God to carry me to His heavenly home, who knows what euphemisms will be uttered? Pastor Bestian “checked out.” He “kicked the bucket.” He “sold the farm.” He’s “pushing up daisies” or “juggling haloes now.” Perhaps he’s “taking up harp lessons.” Or, in the elegant words of E.E. Cummings, he “started a worm farm.”

But those who know me best, and the confidence I have in God, only need four words: *Brian died in faith*. That will do it. Those four words will speak honesty, truth, and love—all at the same time. And the Lord will be praised! (As He should be!) ✠

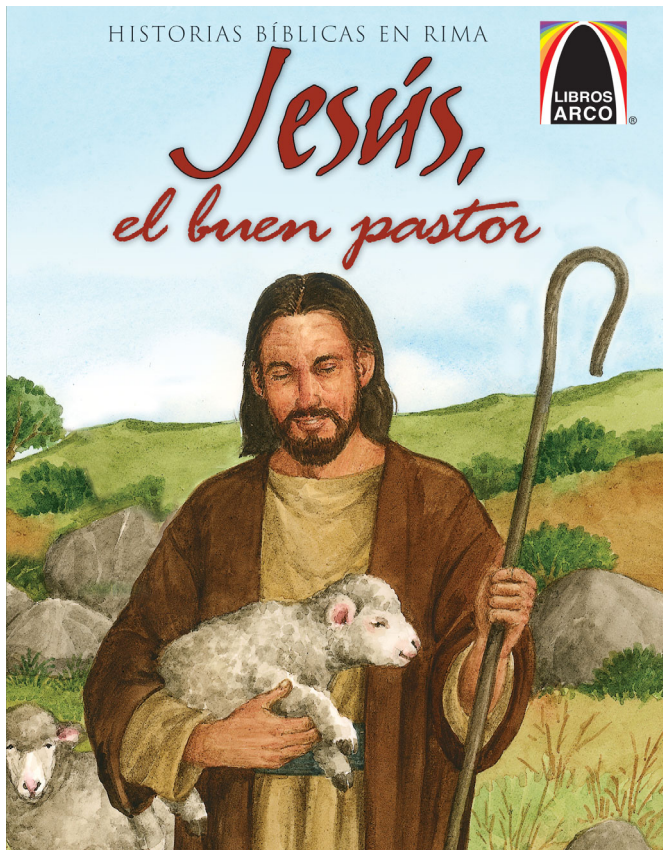

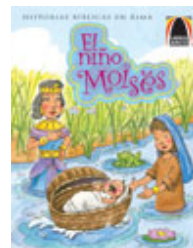

## Apostasy

Apo-what? I'm sure your Lutheran brain has kicked in and asked, *What does this mean?* If so, I'm glad you're asking. *Apostasy* (noun) is defined as the renouncement or abandonment of a religious or political belief. If you've been watching entertainment news or social media, there's been a few Christian public figures, such as Hillsong songwriter Marty Sampson or writer Josh Harris, who have turned away from the faith. I wanted to share snippets of the response from another entertainment figure -lead singer of *Skillet*, John Cooper. Although I've heard of *Skillet*, I've never been a fan of their style of music, but I am in agreement with what he said. No editing was done to the following snippets of his statement. Ask your Youth Director for the full copy of his statement, which is truly worth the read.

"Ok I'm saying it. Because it's too important not to. What is happening in Christianity? More and more of our outspoken leaders or influencers who were once "faces" of the faith are falling away. And at the same time they are being very vocal and bold about it. Shockingly they still want to influence others (for what purpose?) as they announce that they are leaving the faith. I'll state my conclusion, then I'll state some rebuttals to statements I've read by some of them. Firstly, I never judge people outside of my faith. Even if they hate religion or Christianity. That is not my place and I have many friends who disagree with my religion and that is 100% fine with me. However, when it comes to people within my faith, there must be a measure of loyalty and friendship and accountability to each other and the Word of God..."

"...My conclusion for the church (all of us Christians): We must STOP making worship leaders and thought leaders or influencers or cool people or "relevant" people the most influential people in Christendom. (And yes that includes people like me!) I've

been saying for 20 years (and seemed probably quite judgmental to some of my peers) that we are in a dangerous place when the church is looking to 20 year old worship singers as our source of truth. We now have a church culture that learns who God is from singing modern praise songs rather than from the teachings of the Word. I'm not being rude to my worship leader friends (many who would agree with me) in saying that singers and musicians are good at communicating emotion and feeling. We create a moment and a vehicle for God to speak. However, singers are not always the best people to write solid Bible truth and doctrine..."

"... It is time for the church to rediscover the preeminence of the Word. And to value the teaching of the Word. We need to value truth over feeling. Truth over emotion. And what we are seeing now is the result of the church raising up influencers who did not supremely value truth who have led a generation who also do not believe in the supremacy of truth. And now those disavowed leaders are proudly still leading and influencing boldly AWAY from the truth... Brothers and sisters in the faith all around the world, pastors, teachers, worship leaders, influencers...I implore you, please please in your search for relevancy for the gospel, let us NOT find creative ways to shape Gods word into the image of our culture by stifling inconvenient truths."



**But rather let us hold on even tighter to the anchor of the living Word of God. For He changes NOT.**

*"The grass withers and the flowers fade away, but the word of our God stands forever" (Isaiah 40:8)"*

So where exactly am I going with this? As I repeat time and again, sink yourself into the Word of God. Everything you come up against, everything you're taught, you measure up to the truth found in Scripture. Let your Bible ALWAYS be your source of measuring every word, every action, every person, every situation. Always seek the answers in the Word of God...even Martin Luther encouraged this, which is why he continuously asks throughout the Small and Large Catechism *"What does this mean?"* The true and correct answer to that one question will always be found in the Holy Word of God, nowhere else.

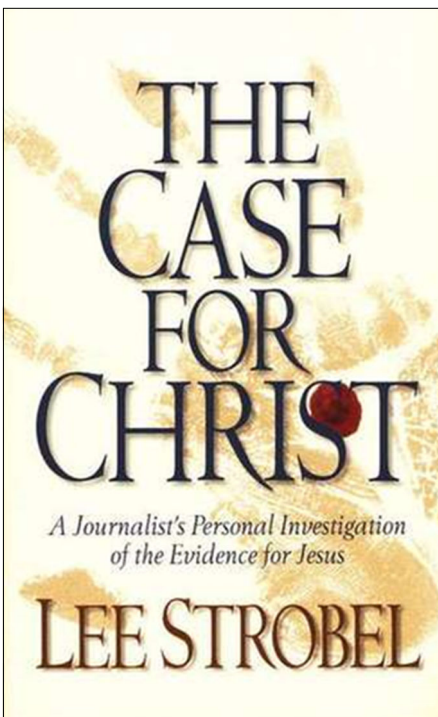



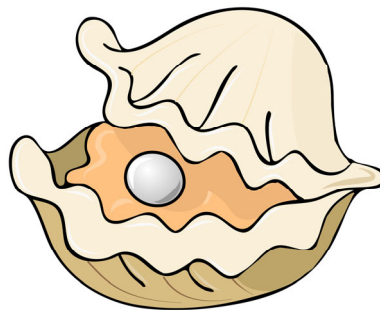
## Stewardship Minute—The Pearl of Great Price

Jesus said, "Again, the kingdom of Heaven is like a merchant looking for fine pearls. When he found one of great value, he went away and sold everything he had and bought it" (Matthew 13A5-46).

Who knew that Jesus was the **pearl of great price**? After all, wasn't He just "the carpenter's son"? (Matthew 13:55) "The chief priests and the whole Sanhedrin were looking for false evidence against Jesus . . ." (Matthew 26:59) because, rather than seeing Him for what He was and is, **the pearl of great price**, they were threatened by Him and wanted to destroy Him.

Even His disciples who had lived with Him, eaten with Him, listened to Him, and worked beside Him for three years found Him to be not **the pearl of great price**, but a danger to their lives and reputations and they "deserted Him and fled" (Matthew 26:56) at His time of need.

What about us? We have the advantage of past history. We have God's Word. We know of Jesus' perfect life lived in our place; we know of His anguished prayer for us before His Father; we know of His death on the cross that paid the price for our sin; we know of His triumphant resurrection; and we know how our lives are made new in Him. Do we view Him as **the pearl of great price**? Are we willing to sell everything we have to give for Him? Or are we hoarding our assets, refusing to share? Are we sealing our lips, fearing rejection if we speak His name? God give us grace to proclaim Jesus, **our pearl of great price**.

## Raise the Roof Goal Met!



Praise the Lord! "Raise the Roof" has met the goal of \$175,000 in donations. Total expenditures for "Raise the Roof" were \$172,309.22. The goal for "Raise the Roof" was originally de-

cided in December 2017 by the "Raise the Roof" Committee and allowed the team to complete all originally scheduled work along with additional efforts. We would like to thank everyone involved in the "Raise the Roof" committee and campaign, your contributions were appreciated. The "Raise the Roof" Campaign is officially over, and the extra money raised during the campaign will be discussed in the next Congregational Meeting.

As "Raise the Roof" ends Ascension Lutheran Church is establishing a maintenance fund. The building and

grounds for Ascension are getting older and the goal of this effort is to fund the on going maintenance that is not currently in the annual budget. Each year the Board of Trustees has busted their budget due to emerging maintenance issues and concerns. Establishing this fund will help Ascension keep up with current building codes, fund emergency maintenance, and allow for unexpected building expenses (e.g. plumbing). New envelopes will be placed in the pews to support this and other donation efforts. We want to thank everyone for their current and future support to all of our ministries.

## Books Go Where Missionaries Cannot

**Somalia, in Northeast Africa, is one of the world's most dangerous places to be a Christian.**

Over 99 percent of the country's population identifies as Muslim, and it's not hard to see why. Sharia law is enshrined in Somalia's constitution, and anyone who expresses doubt about Islam or even curiosity about another religion faces intense persecution: harassment, property damage and physical attacks.

Religious leaders speak openly about eliminating Christianity from Somalia, and any Somali who is found to worship Jesus – or worse, shares the Good News with others – risks immediate execution. Despite the dangers, a small community of Christians (probably fewer than 10,000 people of the country's 8 million inhabitants) perseveres.

**Where does a believer turn when there are no churches?**

The isolation felt by the one-in-a-thousand Somali Christian is significant. Though it is a dangerous proposition – and some have died in the process – small, secret groups of Christians have formed, including a Somali Lutheran Church.

With no known trained pastors inside Somalia's borders, LHF's catechisms and devotions published in the Somali language bring answers to questions, com-

fort and a sense of belonging to a larger church family.

Rev. Warsame (names are changed for their protection), a Lutheran pastor and evangelist, is passionate about sharing LHF publications with his Somali people. Though he himself has suffered physical attacks and threats of death, Rev. Warsame is determined to share LHF books inside Somalia's borders. And now, he writes, he may have found a way:

*"Greetings! I have traveled to Ethiopia... [and met] Brother Diric, a young man who graduated from Mekane Yesus Seminary a few years ago. He requested that LHF books be delivered to a group of believers in Somalia. He said that even though the number of those who attend his Friday service is small, there are many converts and seekers there who would very much like to receive and read the books by themselves, as they fear persecution if their Christian faith is exposed. He said that LHF books are a great source for teaching and learning the Christian faith.*

*"Since the Somali border police will not permit Christian literature into their country, he suggested that we smuggle about 100 books every month, and he promised to distribute them immediately. My church elders and I applauded his proposal and assured him that we will start the process of smuggling as soon as the books arrive.*

*"Two weeks ago, I met a trader of my clan who regularly smuggles contraband goods, and I asked about the possibility of delivering three boxes of Christian*

*books to someone in Somalia. The trader said, 'That is not problem at all. We don't care about the contents; just pack and seal them well, and we will take them to anywhere you want in Somalia.'*

*"Brother Diric also proposed that his congregation, which currently has about eight members, become part of our Somali Lutheran Church, which the elders and I welcomed.*

*"Additionally, one of the elders and I traveled to a camp of internally displaced people to visit some converts there and to deliver Somali Bibles. We met five believers in the camp and three in town. They told us that there are more believers and seekers in their areas and they requested for teaching and Christian literature. We spent two days in each location, during which I answered their questions about Christianity, Islam and the difference between the two faiths, and I instructed them on how to pray and how to read the Bible.*

*"Finally, in my own city, I have been teaching five new converts (three women and two men), separately at different hours and in different venues, to make sure that before they are allowed to join the fellowship, their conversion is genuine and they are reliable people."*
